


Edwardian

Brother W D Foley



The College was sad to announce the news of **Brother W D Foley** who died on Friday 7 October 2005, aged 95 years.

Brother Foley was educated at St Edward's College in the 1920s before joining the Christian Brothers, and then taught in various schools. After the end of the Second World War he enjoyed a spell as Headmaster of Gibraltar Grammar School, and was awarded an OBE in recognition of his contribution to Gibraltese education. He was the first Old Edwardian to become College Headmaster in the mid 1950s, and was a significant figure in raising the academic profile of the College. He then went to St Ambrose College, Altrincham, also as Headmaster. He returned to St Edward's after retiring, helping with careers, and continued to live in St Clare until the late 1990s. In recent years he has lived at Ince Blundell Nursing Home, Br Foley continued to show a lively interest in the fortunes of the College and was keen to receive a copy of the examination results each year and The Edwardian; he attended a College music concert earlier this year. The Foley Building, which accommodates MFL was named in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the College over eighty years.

His funeral took place at St Peter and Paul's Church in Crosby on 13 October 2005, which, quite aptly, was also the Feast of St Edward, King and Confessor.

The College led the organisation of the Service, as Brother Foley had wished.



Most Generous Young Person

Head Girl Francesca D'Arcy was presented with a prestigious Beacon Prize for charitable giving, winning the 'Most Generous Young Person' category at a ceremony at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Francesca was presented with her prize by the Right Honourable David Miliband, MP at the Foreign Office ceremony. Other winners included Sir Bob Geldof, receiving the Beacon Prize for Leadership, and Jamie Oliver, receiving a special award for Most Generous Celebrity. Francesca was chosen for volunteering her time and skills since the age of 10 to raise funds for charities. At the age of just 17 Francesca has raised an incredible £50,000 in such endeavour with a particular focus on Marie Curie Cancer. She has also spearheaded several original fundraising initiatives, bringing on board important sections of the local community: businesses, churches and the media.

Francesca's hard work was inspired by the wife of the late Roy Castle. She began fundralsing by encouraging people to pick up coins on the ground and in her first year raised £5,000 for Claire House Children's Hospice. Her ideas then spiralled to include designing and selling Teddy Bears, organising Christmas and Easter fairs, Country and Western evenings and creating a '5p appeal', asking people to donate loose change. To date, this appeal has collected over £4,000 for the Woodlands Hospice.

Former St. Edward's Maths teacher **Miss Claire Daley** was one of three people chosen by Liverpool City Council to sail a leg on the Clipper 2005-06 Round the World Yacht Race – for free. She was chosen from a shortlist of 12 and began training in April. The sever leg, circumnavigational race started in Liverpool on Sunday, September 18 and returns to the city in Summer 2006. The Liverpool '06 Clipper – a newly created 68-foot yacht – promotes Liverpool as European Capital of Culture, 2008. 


Archbishop Oscar Romero Mass



Year 12 Biology trip to Shrewsbury

On 14 July Year 12 travelled to a Field Study Centre in Shropshire in preparation f their A2 Biology course, spending two days in the outdoors. After a brief introduction to Ecology, it was time to put theory into practice by pond dipping for a wide variety aquatic vertebrate species. The highlight of the 'dip' was the capture of a magnifical Mayfly Larva and a number of crested newt tadpoles. During the evening, statistic data was analysed from both the pond dip and an investigation on the effects of ligin intensity on the size of nettle leaves. The following day the Biologists used a bransect to show succession and zonation at Crosmere Lake. It was an interesting was to learn about the different ecological techniques used to investigate the abiotic ar biotic factors of a hydrospehere. The day ended with the recording of results in the form of kite diagrams.



Year 8 When Art Meets Science


On 14 May Year 8 pupils took part in a workshop where the looked at the life and work of Leonardo Da Vinci and his influence on the Science and Engineering of today.


upper school production: the tempest




The complex special effects demanded by the play's nature were splendidly achieved. Well done to all involved, a production that was not only impressive but hugely enjoyable!



Da Vinci/Artisan Chinese New Year Celebrations



Then following numerous spectacular handling moves **Anthony Daley** finished off a superb team try. **Mark Polson** and then **Thomas McNeils**, following superb inter play between the forwards and backs added further tries. **David Whitely** was able to land two conversions to give a winning lead of 24 -6. With the game won, credit must go to Kirkham who added a late consolation try. However, it was **Daniel O'Brien**, who lifted the trophy and spoke on behalf of the team. All players involved contributed to a special occasion which was a perfect reward for five seasons' hard work as a team. 
