Growing in Faith

In 1802, Blessed Edmund Rice founded the Christian Brothers in Waterford, Ireland: these were men whose mission was to raise the dignity and well being of the poorest in society through education.

In 1853, Father James Nugent founded the Catholic Institute in Hope Street Liverpool, a small school for boys. Father Nugent was a man of immense compassion who worked tirelessly for the poor and less fortunate.

In 1902 the Catholic Institute was saved from closure by the Christian Brothers. Within two years the school had become hugely successful and in 1920 became St Edward's College. The school moved to its present site in Sandfield Park in 1938 and having administered a highly successful school for many years, the Christian Brothers remain Trustees of the College. The values of Edmund Rice and Fr Nugent remain embedded in the life of the College.

Lower School, Years 7 - 9

The Lower School curriculum enables pupils to enjoy, achieve and grow in confidence. A large emphasis is placed on pupils developing the necessary skills for life, encouraging them to think, communicate, work within a team and reflect on their learning. The curriculum is broad and is taught using the latest technology, including interactive white boards in all classrooms and several dedicated ICT suites, with plenty of opportunities for learning beyond the classroom through a variety of school trips. By the end of Year 8, all College pupils have been given the opportunity to travel to either Spain or France with the Modern Foreign Languages department.



Middle School, Years 10 and 11

All pupils study to GCSE level in English, Mathematics, Science and Religious Education and can choose to specialise by selecting to study three subjects from a list of option choices (including at least one Modern Foreign Language).

Through the 'Pathways' programme, pupils follow a curriculum that is appropriate to their needs, provides challenge and enables all individuals to succeed. They will finish Year 11 equipped with a range of appropriate qualifications, skills and attributes to enable them to pursue their chosen path into further education or employment.

Upper School, Years 12 and 13

Becoming an Upper School pupil at St Edward's College is an exciting time and will be both challenging and enjoyable. We have high expectations of our Upper School pupils and they in turn receive excellent tuition and pastoral support from staff at the College.

Complementing A Level studies is a range of enrichment activities which will enable pupils to grow in maturity and social responsibility. These activities help to develop initiative, independence, leadership and organisational skills, all of which are extremely useful when applying to university or for employment.

The College is one of a handful of schools in the UK to have been judged by Ofsted as 'Outstanding' in three consecutive inspections.

GCSE results are consistently high and, each year, a number of pupils move on to Upper School having achieved A* and A grades in all of their GCSE subjects.

Each year an impressive proportion of pupils achieve at least three A grades at A Level, and many more go on to some of the UK's most prestigious Universities. All pupils are encouraged to take part in activities beyond the classroom and we offer a broad range of curriculum enhancing and extra-curricular activities. Pupils represent the College at local, regional and national level in a range of sports, music and other cultural activities. The curriculum is enriched by an extensive array of school trips, offered to stimulate and promote learning and enjoyment in different environments.

The range and quality of the extra-curricular activities on offer supports the College's aim to empower pupils to realise their own particular potential. Pupils can choose from over 60 extra-curricular clubs and activities that take place during the school year, including music, dance and drama, 15 different sports, the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, debating, information technology, creative writing and many more.

Sport

The College boasts excellent sports facilities including the swimming pool, dance studio/gymnasium, astroturf pitch, running track and extensive grassed areas. Pupils participate in fixtures against local and regional schools each weekend in rugby, hockey, netball and cricket as well as midweek fixtures in a range of other sports.

At the heart of St Edward's philosophy towards sport is a commitment to participation and enjoyment above competition and success.

Performing Arts

St Edward's also has a very strong tradition in the Performing Arts, particularly Music and Drama.

The College has achieved both regional and national recognition in Drama and pupils have the opportunity to perform in a number of drama productions that take place during the school year. A large number of the College's musicians perform to an exceptionally high standard and the College has a National reputation for music. As with sport, there is a strong emphasis on participation; regular concerts take place, 160 hours of individual music tuition are delivered by peripatetic staff each week with over 200 pupils taking part in music related extra-curricular activities. Each year a cohort of pupils are successful in their applications to study Music at University.
